Dear Friends,

The Church of Scotland faces many difficulties and challenges today, but two in particular are very current; one about money and the other about morals.

The whole system for paying ministers' stipends is in trouble and needs urgent action within the next 5 or 6 years. Basically the annual payroll bill is considerably more than the annual income to the National Stipend Fund, perhaps 15% more. The difference has been being made up out of the Ministries Council's capital reserves but at the present rate those reserves will be exhausted in 6 or 7 years. This seems to be partly due to inadequate planning; the department which decided on adjustments and so the number of ministers who would need paid, and the department responsible for Stipend level and structure were quite separate until a few years ago. Partly it is due to 'success' in providing ministers; the Stipend structure was designed on the basis that the number of ministers in the Church would decline rather faster than it has actually done, leaving more money to be found.

Naturally, there is a grave need to decide what to do about this and there are ongoing consultations. As in many other walks of life, minister's stipends have been frozen this year. The questions of whether there should be fewer parishes, or ministers should be spread more thinly around parishes and new ways of conducting ministry will all certainly be considered. The next round of consultations is in early February. Please pray for wisdom for those involved and guidance into the best way forward.

The moral challenge is, of course, about sexuality and the ministry. As is well known, there are those who wish to change the Church's longstanding position that ministers should not be sexually active except in (heterosexual) marriage - at least as regards those who are in committed homosexual relationships. Last year's General Assembly set up a Special Commission on Same-Sex Relationships and the Ministry to consult widely on this matter and report in 2011. Their consultation and discussion paper is expected before the end of February and every Presbytery and Kirk Session is required to respond to it by the end of May. Please pray for our Session and all church courts as this controversial and potentially divisive matter is discussed.

In the wider world, let us not forget Haiti but help its people by our personal giving and by supporting the congregational lunch on Communion Sunday.

When and what is Lent?

In 2010 Lent begins on 17 February

What is Lent?

Lent is a Christian Festival. In the past it was a long, strict religious fast when people gave up all rich food. The day before Lent starts is known as Shrove Tuesday.

What happens during Lent today?

The Christian church no longer imposes a strict fast. Lent is a time when some Christians try to overcome their own faults because they believe that it was man's sin which led Jesus to be crucified. It can be thought of as a time for spring-cleaning our lives.

They try to follow the example of Jesus in the desert by giving up luxuries and practising self-discipline. And they try to put aside more time to prayer and religious acts so that they can really let God guide their lives.

Bible Study

Many churches hold special Lent services. In some towns the churches of different denominations join together in groups to discuss and share their Christian faith.

In Newtonhill, we hold services on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday and are also planning to open the church for prayer and contemplation at various times during Holy Week. The St Michaels Road Bible Study Group will be holding a special Lent study, and anyone who would like to know more about this should speak to Pauline Platt (730465) – all are most welcome.

When does Lent begin?

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and lasts for six and a half weeks.

Lent is a moveable feast which means the date changes from year to year. In 2010 Ash Wednesday is on 17 February.

When does Lent end?

Lent ends at Easter when we remember the execution of Jesus and then celebrate his rising from death.

The last week of Lent begins with Palm Sunday, which celebrates the day Jesus entered Jerusalem and the people lay down palms at his feet. The last day of Lent is Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday (Easter Day)

Why are Sundays not counted in the 40 days?

Sundays are always a day of celebration in the Christian church and so they cannot be included in the 40 fast days of Lent.

Why does Lent last for 40 days?

Lent is a time when Christians remember the 40 days and nights Jesus spent alone in the desert without food and being tempted by the Devil. Jesus used this time to prepare for His work by fasting and praying.

Luke's Gospel says:

'Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the desert, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and at the end of them he was hungry.' Luke 4:1-3 (NIV)

So, as in the Bible, Christians spend forty days in preparing themselves to rejoice at the resurrection of Jesus Christ at Easter.

Interesting fact

The number 40 is a special number in the Bible. It signifies preparation for something special:

Noah and the Flood – 'And rain fell on the earth forty days and forty nights.' (Genesis 7:12)

Moses stayed on Mount Sinai forty days (Exodus 24:18)

Jonah gave the people of Nineveh forty days to repent (Jonah 3:4)

Jesus, before starting his ministry, spent forty days in the desert in prayer and fasting (Matt 4:2; Luke 4:1)

Matthew 18:12-14 The Parable of the Lost sheep

"What do you think? If a man owns a hundred sheep, and one of them wanders away, will he not leave the ninety-nine on the hills and go to look for the one that wandered off"? And if he finds it, I tell you the truth, he is happier about that one sheep than about the ninety-nine that did not wander off.
